### **At Christmas**



### From the Desk of Nancy Church, RN

With our office on the 2nd floor of the Marie Yeager Cancer Center overlooking the waiting room, we are excited when we get to hear the bell ringing and people clapping, signifying a milestone of completing treatment for the person who is ringing the bell. The tradition began in 1996 at M.D. Anderson when Irve Le Moyne, a rear admiral in the U.S. Navy decided to follow a Navy tradition of ringing a bell to signify "when the job was done". He brought a brass bell to his last radiation treatment, rang it several times and left it as a donation. It was mounted on a wall plaque at the radiation treatment center, inscription by Irve Le Moyne:



Ringing Out
Ring this bell
Three times well
Its toll to clearly say,
My treatment's done
This course is run
And I am on my way!

Ringing the bell caught on at other cancer treatment center and soon became a tradition for patients to mark the end of a certain phase a treatment. Each bell ringing has a unique meaning to the person ringing the bell and some end up ringing the bell more than once during their treatment course. Traditions give us encouragement to celebrate what we have accomplished. What amazes me about this story, is how one person's inspiration of ringing a bell has spread from clinic to clinic to an international celebration signifying an important milestone in patients' lives.

This past year, BCCS celebrated our 75th anniversary! Many of you were at the Howard Performing Arts Center to cheer the 75 years of caring for those with cancer in the local community. It is always humbling to contemplate how it is YOU who have faithfully given over the years. So far in 2023, you have provided over 1,000 in-home skilled nursing visits. One of these is a lady who gratefully says, "BCCS has helped me because I don't drive and their nurse comes to my house every month to draw my blood. I'm so thankful to have their help." Another patient has mobility issues related to her cancer making coming to the clinic very difficult for the frequent blood draws during treatment. Her comment of thankfulness, "The Berrien County Cancer Service helps me to believe in mankind again. Throughout my journey I have met the most wonderful people.... My nurse comes comes and draws my blood and brings equipment that I need. She makes the experience very pleasant because she is a very loving and kind individual. I feel truly blessed to have her in my life."

As you contemplate this year the impact that you want to have to make someone's life a little easier, know that behind every dollar given to BCCS is a story of someone who is going through a health crisis and is receiving the extra supportive care that we provide in their journey of life.
